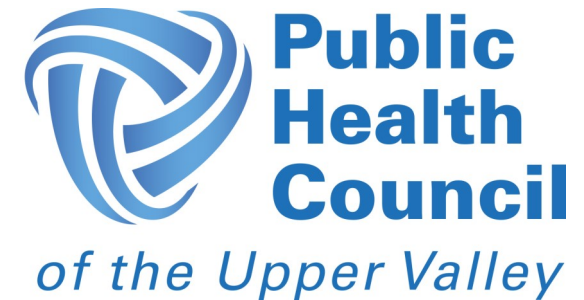

The Public Health Council has had another great year! We continued to address leading health concerns for the region by bringing partners together to try new things, expand quality programs, and fill service gaps.

We expanded access to oral health care, provided healthy food to children during summer months, and protected many neighbors against flu.

We were particularly pleased to welcome the Upper Valley Community Nursing Project to our “family” as this project, which helps elders receive continuity of care and remain independent at home, so nicely reflects our own mission.

The upcoming year promises to be busy, especially for our staff and working groups. In addition to our usual coalition work and project development, we will work with area hospitals to conduct the community health needs assessment they do every three years. We use the results to update our Community Health Improvement Plan. We revise our priorities and strategic direction based on what our communities and partners want from us.

The needs assessment will be complete by the fall of 2018 and we will launch into planning for the next three years of collaborative work. This is a rewarding time to reflect on our progress so far and set a course for the future.

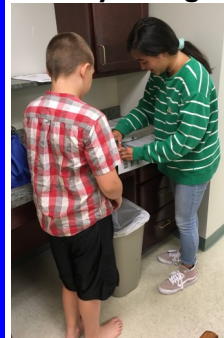

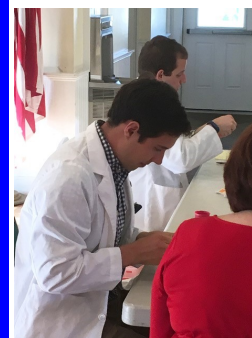
