


Greater Upper Valley Integrated Services Team Early Childhood Service Delivery Integration Network October 2023

The Problem & Opportunity

In 2021, eight Upper Valley residents with young children were interviewed about their experiences with social service agencies and providers to help us understand:

- ✓ Through what avenues do individuals become aware of and gain access to the services they use?

 Awareness of services is facilitated largely by interactions with service agency employees.
- ✓ What influences perception of quality of services, coordination and connectedness in social service support networks? Individual service providers and agency-employees play key roles in families' support networks. The factor that most influences participants' perception of service quality is the degree to which a person feels judged vs. respected.
- ✓ What types of services do participants access? What size, composition, structure are family-level social service support networks? Parents of young children are often in the position of managing communication with multiple service agencies. All participants described a "daisy"-shaped network, with themselves surrounded by a set of fairly disconnected agencies. Participants engaged with as few as 4 and as many as 13 organizations.
